Preprimary Children

- Preprimary children are those birth to school age
- •The only time a 3-year-old can be claimed on NSLP/SBP is if they are receiving Special Ed. services because they are on an IEP or have a 504 plan
 - The only information we would need to show why 3-year-olds being claimed is enrollment documentation



Claiming Preprimary Children

- •A preprimary child not enrolled in the district CANNOT be claimed under the National School Lunch/School breakfast program
- Preprimary children can participate in the CACFP program
 - •Preprimary *CANNOT* be claimed under the At-Risk program it is only for school age children *OR*
- General Fund can pay for these meals



Headstart Programs in School

- •If a Head Start/Even Start program is in your district, the school cannot claim meals if the children enrolled in that Head Start/Even Start program are not enrolled in the district
 - •This would be 3-year-olds (not on an IEP or 504 plan) and younger



School NOT Participating in CACFP

- The school must pay or charge the parent the Adult amount listed on the Schedule B for breakfast and lunch
- These meals will be coded as local (000) expenses



At-Risk program and Regular CACFP program are two completely different programs with different requirements



At-Risk vs Regular CACFP

AT-Risk

- Must be in an area 50% or more F/R
- All school age children eat for free
- Can only claim 2 meals per day
- Meals can only be claimed during the school year

CACFP

- There are no eligibility requirements for Public Schools to participate
- Meals are claimed by Free, Reduced, and Paid
- A child can be claimed for 2 main meals and a snack per day
- Meals can be claimed all year long

At-Risk vs Regular CACFP

AT-Risk

- Only school age children can participate in At-Risk
- Educational and/or Enrichment activity is required
- It can only be served after the school day has ended

Regular CACFP

- This program is for infants through age 12
- There is no educational requirement
- Meals can be served throughout the day. However, Must be a minimum of 2 hours between main meal and snack



CACFP Programs

- A separate online applications must be completed annually
 - It is different than the school lunch application and the At-Risk application
- The CACFP meal pattern is different than the school meal pattern
- CACFP is for ages infant through 12 years of age enrolled in the center
- There are annual training requirements to participate
- ALL CACFP Reviews are unannounced and conducted every 2-3 years



CACFP Reimbursement

- The rates for CACFP are different than the school rates.
 There is no additional incentive for CACFP, and CACFP does not get commodities, however, they receive cashin-lieu
- (Below are rates from FY2023)

CACFP RatesFree

- Breakfast \$2.21
- Lunch \$4.03
- Snack \$1.18
- Cash-in-lieu \$.3000

School Rates Free

- Breakfast \$2.26
- Severe NeedBreakfast \$2.67
- Lunch \$4.33
- •Snack \$1.08



School Contracting with CACFP

- •The district can contract meals with the daycare center or a Head Start/Even Start program. However, it is required the district charge the center the free rate plus the commodity rate for all meals
 - The district will bill themselves if CACFP is being ran by the school OR bill the Head Start/Even Start program
 - Head Start/Even Start programs are required to participate in CACFP so they can claim the meals you billed them for
 - The school must use OSDE Agreement to Furnish Food when contracting these meals



Mixed Classes

- If the district has a mixture of children enrolled in the district and some not enrolled in the district, the school does not have to divide up the children or claim
- Example: The district has a head start program with 70 children. 10 of those kids are enrolled in the district and 60 are not enrolled. The school can bill the head start for all 70 kids in the head start program
- The school is not required to claim the kids enrolled in the school or divide the kids up based on enrollment status. You can claim all children with Head Start/Even Start or CACFP

CACFP Approval

- Training is required before you can fill out the application
- Once the CACFP application is approved, your program specialist will have 30 days to come to your district to conduct an approval visit
- After approval, you will be able to start claiming meals
- Before you can submit your first claim, your specialist will come out to look at your paperwork and assist with filing

CACFP Application

- If you are already approved for At-Risk, the CACFP must be added to your application
 - CACFP training is still required before you can participate
- •If you are currently on the At-Risk program with only one site listed in the application, you will have to reapply in order to add the CACFP program



CACFP Approval Process

- To participate when school starts, we highly recommend starting the application process now
- In 2023, our CACFP application numbers have been much higher than previous years. The process can take longer than in past years

CACFP Participant Meals

- •All of our current CACFP entities do not charge meals to their participants as the amount is apart of their daycare tuition
- •If you want to charge the family for these meals while participating on CACFP, you will need to let us know, and it will need to be indicated in the online application
